



DOS & DONTs FOR TOURIST.

This Code of Conduct, created in consultation with the local community of the Quirimbas, establishes the ethical principles and standards that should guide relations between tourists and the local community within the Quirimbas National Park.



Be polite, positive and respectful towards the local community. You can greet people by saying "Salamal!" or thank with "obrigado/a".



Ask for permission to take pictures.



Support the local economy by purchasing handicrafts and local products.



Ask for an officially recognized local tour guide when walking through the mangroves to Quirimba and to the lighthouse, they have the local knowledge to ensure your safety.



Respect the environment and landscape of the islands, dispose of any waste properly.



If you want to make a donation, ask your hotel or an official tour guide how to do this.



Remember to pay the Quirimbas National Park entry fees



Avoid wearing revealing clothing when visiting the villages. Avoid short-shorts, mini-skirts, transparent or tights clothes.



If you want to help children, avoid giving them cash or handouts, as this will discourage them from attending school and will encourage begging.



If children propose themselves as guides, discourage this practice since this will prevent them from attending school



If you are visiting during Ramadan, please do not eat in front of local people.



Avoid public displays of affection (e. g kissing).



Photography of government and police buildings is prohibited.



Avoid collecting seashells as they are an important part of coastal ecosystem and are key for the survival of marine species.
